Their online mooring system uses Google Map to show mooring information based on GPS coordinates. It allows updates by permit holders and shows mooring field boundaries. The cost is \$5 per permit issued or renewed. Permit fees can be paid online for a 3% credit card charge.

 - A. DEP permitting process The LEAN process is now in effect.
 - B. Dredging Norwalk and Old Saybrook projects are underway. \$1,000,000 was provided to Norwalk by the State of Connecticut to compensate for DEP capping requirements being stricter than the ACOE. (See the Connecticut Maritime Commission March 2009 meeting minutes at

- D. Harbormaster Issues Mike Griffin: Not much has changed since November 2007. New Haven harbor now has no public marinas.
- 4. Harbor Management Breakout Session

A. Discussion of the new LEAN permitting process. Norwalk is developing a requirements checklist and considering charging a fee for permit review. They are planning to amend their Harbor management Plan to implement these requirements.

Connecticut Lake Authorities

- Lake Authorities are essentially corporations formed by two or more towns which
 have within their territorial limits a body of state water and are authorized by <u>CGS</u>
 <u>7-151a</u>.
- Lake Patrol Officers are appointed by the Commissioner of the DEP and are authorized to carry a baton, firearm, or both upon completion of the proper training. CGS 7-151b
- Lake Patrol Officers are supervised by the Environmental Conservation sergeant responsible for the area the lake is in.
